Message from the Director

Fiscal Year 22 was a banner year for the Csomay Center, full of transition, innovation, growth, and strategic planning. We began with a June 1, 2021, transition in directorship from Dr. Marianne Smith to me. I am deeply fortunate to follow her very able leadership which positioned the Center to move strategically into the future.

This summer I had the pleasure of visiting long time Center partners with Center Coordinator Ryleigh Maas on a Director's Tour. As a recent transplant from Florida, it was valuable not only to learn lowa's healthcare landscape but the geographical landscape as well. The Center hosted our inaugural Csomay Summer Scholar, an engaged and motivated young woman from Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, lowa, and we also laid the groundwork for a strategic planning retreat in the fall.

Thinking strategically where we want the center to go in the next three to five years, our leadership team gathered for the two-day retreat in September. The attendees self-selected into task forces which developed the five pillars of our new strategic plan, as well as generating the goals, critical tasks, tactics, and measurable indicators which will help us achieve these goals. I am grateful for all the people who contributed to this important initiative by either being interviewed by our strategic planning consultant or attending the retreat.

The fall also saw the development and implementation of the new multi-level mentoring program, the Csomay Community of Scholars, under the direction of Center Leadership Team member, Dr. Juliana de Souza Talarico, as well as the first ever Investiture Ceremony in the College of Nursing where both Center Co-Director Dr. Keela Herr and I were honored.

Spring semester was equally busy with awarding three new Csomay Research Grants to emerging gerontological clinician scientists, convening a steering committee comprised of palliative clinicians, educators, and researchers to develop a palliative incubator, growing the Csomay Community of Scholars, and extending the Director's Tour to state level stakeholders.

During this year of transition, I have found three key resources that assure the Csomay Center is ready to lead in the future. The long history of the Center as a John A. Hartford Foundation funded center of nursing excellence; the passionate, talented, interprofessional Csomay Leadership Team that I inherited from Marianne or invited to join after becoming director; and our engaged donors like John Bowers who supports the Center in memory of his mother through the Marilynn H. Bowers Dementia Education and Research Fund and Claude Freeman who supports the Center in memory of his wife through the Jo Hoyt Freeman Dementia Education and Outreach Fund.

I am proud of the work that each member of the Center, whether donor, staff, student, faculty, or community partner, contributed towards our mission to advance innovations in research, education, and practice to promote optimal aging for all older adults and their caregivers, and I look forward to seeing what comes next.

The Csomay Center for Gerontological Excellence, housed in the University of Iowa (UI) College of Nursing, is leading the way to support and improve the care of older adults throughout Iowa and beyond. Rising out of one of the five original Hartford Centers in the country, seed funding from the John A. Hartford Foundation helped launch the Center in 2017. As the only gerontological center at UI, the Csomay Center is built on a strong, foundation of funding and stands as a leader in geriatric research and a national model for centers of its kind.

The Csomay Center is uniquely positioned; not only is the UI College of Nursing at the forefront of aging-related research, education, and practice, but it also is located in a state that ranks fourth in the nation for people aged 75 and older, and second in the nation for people aged 85 and older. One goal of the Csomay Center is to ensure that the future of UI gerontological excellence is as bright as the past.


Investiture Ceremony

Director's Tour

This past year, Dr. Marianne Smith retired as center director and Dr. Harleah Buck transitioned into this leadership role. Dr. Buck brings more than 30 years as a gerontological clinician, researcher, and leader. Dr. Buck was recruited from the



University of South Florida, bringing a strong clinical background in the care of older adults with heart failure. A former Associate Director of the Center of Geriatric Nursing Excellence at Penn State, she brings an equally strong leadership background in aging initiatives. As a native of Florida, Dr. Buck is new to the Iowa healthcare landscape. She has spent the better part of her first year learning about opportunities in Iowa and building relationships within the university and across the state.

The goals of the Director's Tour are to increase the visibility of the Center, identify future community partners and build a network of key lowa stakeholders with an interest in aging and the overall purpose is to position the Csomay Center as a leading voice for older adults and rural health in lowa and the country.

The Director's Tour involves Dr. Buck meeting with a leader or group and presenting the Center's mission, vision, strategic initiatives, and expertise available. Dr. Buck then strategizes with the leader ways in which the Center is a valuable partner in helping achieve any mutual goals. At the University of Iowa, Dr. Buck has had high-level meetings with the Office of the Vice President for Research, Public Policy Center, Iowa Neuroscience Institute, Office of Community Engagement, and the Iowa Initiative for Sustainable Communities (IISC). High-level meetings outside the University include AARP-Iowa, Alzheimer's Association-Iowa Chapter, Iowa State University, University of Northern Iowa, and Iowa Department on Aging.

As a direct outcome of the Director's Tour, Dr. Buck was able to broker a meeting between AARP-lowa and IISC which resulted in UI students assisting a rural community team complete their final report on an AARP-lowa funded project. This assistance allowed the community team to apply for future funding.

Dr. Buck will continue scheduling Director's Tour meetings into the next year.

Csomay Summer Scholars

In June 2021 the Csomay Center hosted its inaugural Csomay Summer Scholar. The purpose of the Summer Scholars program is to promote undergraduate engagement in gerontological research and provide them with opportunities for real world experience. Our inaugural summer scholar, Molly Barten, was an undergraduate student from Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, Iowa, with an interest in gaining research experience during her pre-med education. During Molly's mentorship, she worked under Dr. Natany da Costa Ferreira Oberfrank completing a literature review which examined instruments used to measure patient motivation for management of chronic diseases. Molly also assisted Dr. Catherine Cherwin with her research on how chemotherapy alters the microbiome and subsequent symptoms experienced in women with breast cancer.

Continuing on in 2022

For the summer of 2022, the Csomay Center has partnered with Iowa Center for Research by Undergraduates (ICRU) to sponsor the mentorship of three Iowa undergraduates under the guidance of Drs. Catherine Cherwin, Chooza Moon, and Wen Liu. The Csomay Center is proud to continue this initiative in



providing undergraduate exposure and collaboration with gerontological nursing research. The Csomay Summer Scholars program achieves several of our strategic goals, including recruiting and supporting trainees interested in aging-related topics and serving at a hub for trainees across campus doing aging-related work.

Csomay Community of Scholars

The Csomay Community of Scholars (CCoS) is a new initiative in 2021 that offers a platform for rising professionals to advance their leadership and research skills. The CCoS provides members with multi-level mentoring, networking opportunities, and resource support for professional engagements, with the goal of helping members succeed in their current and future career endeavors. The Community engages students and early career faculty with an interest in the care and well-being of older adults from across the University of Iowa and surrounding universities.

Types of Meetings:

CCoS Working Group: The working group aims to facilitate collaboration and dissemination among CCoS members.



CCoS Seminar: The objective of the seminar is to enhance scholarship related to aging and the care of older adults.

GeriatricPain.org

GeriatricPain.org aims to provide clinicians, family caregivers and older adults free access to best practice tools and resources to improve pain care for older adults. The website was originally developed by representatives from five John A. Hartford Centers of Geriatric Nursing Excellence (Iowa, Oregon, Arkansas, California and Pennsylvania) and was hosted by Sigma Theta Tau International until 2017. The website is currently supported by the Csomay Center, where ongoing efforts continue to assure easy access to current evidence-based geriatric pain resources.

A newly revised section of GeriatricPain.org, supported by the Marilynn H. Bowers Dementia Education and Outreach Fund, provides information specifically developed for informal caregivers, including family members, friends or other non-paid individuals, who support older adults as they age. This year, the caregiver section of the website went through an external review to improve the readability and accessibility of its resources.



Csomay Research Grants

The Center's longstanding commitment to research creates knowledge that transitions directly into practice, improving the care and treatment of older people. Generous donors support research that is administered by the Center. While donors' aims may vary, the overarching goal is to promote best gerontological practices.

Barbara and Richard Csomay Gerontology Research Award for Faculty (\$15,000)

The purpose of this award is to enhance optimal health and well-being and improve care and treatment of older persons through research in diverse settings.

Applications must use an interdisciplinary team approach that includes a minimum of two professional disciplines.

Available to: Faculty

Barbara and Richard Csomay Gerontology Research Award for PhD Students and Postdoctoral Fellows (\$3,000)

The purpose of this award is to enhance optimal health and well-being and improve care and treatment of older persons through research in diverse settings.

Available to: PhD students and postdoctoral fellows

Woodrow W. Morris Gerontology Research Award for Faculty (\$5,000)

The purpose of this award is to support research that focuses on the resources, statuses, abilities, and needs of older persons.

Available to: Faculty

Jo Hoyt Freeman Dementia Education and Outreach Fund (\$10,000)

The purpose of this award is to support research that focuses on dementia education and outreach. Preference is given for projects that use a "train the trainer" approach and include a "champion team" of registered nurses and/or certified nursing assistants within each designated facility who will lead the project. Project Overview: The purpose of this study is to further our understanding of important resources and support that promote the health and functions of old adults following illness and hospitalization.

Awarded: Barbara and Richard Csomay Gerontology Research Award for PhD students and postdoctoral fellows

Grant Title: Designing an Art Making Intervention for Older Persons with Chronic Pain

Project overview: The aim of this proposed study is to design an art making intervention specific to older persons with chronic pain. Designing such intervention is a first step of Dr. Kim's program of research about using art making for pain management in older persons, which will ultimately minimize the suffering and maximize the well-being of older persons.

Awarded: Morris Gerontology Research Award for Faculty

Grant Title: Advancing Methods of Measurement and Education for Communication

in Dementia Care

Project Overview: This research evaluates the use of simulation to measure person-centered communication in dementia. The purpose of the proposed research is to advance methods in research and education to improve the care of persons living with dementia using person-centered approaches.



Palliative Care Incubator

The goal of palliative care is to improve quality of life by relieving symptoms and stress. Palliative care is for people of any age, and at any stage in a serious illness, whether that illness is curable, chronic, or life-threatening. The University of Iowa has a strong history of clinical and educational preparation for palliative care but has not had a central research hub for palliative care experts to meet and develop scientific studies and grant applications. Earlier this year, the Csomay Center convened a steering committee to explore creating a palliative care incubator to address this gap. Over the next year, the leadership team will hold quarterly meetings to develop leadership and protocols to advance this initiative.
